



**DECISION AND STATEMENT OF REASONS OF ALISON KELLY, LEGAL
MEMBER OF THE FIRST-TIER TRIBUNAL WITH DELEGATED POWERS OF
THE CHAMBER PRESIDENT**

**Under Rule 8 of the First-tier Tribunal for Scotland Housing and Property
Chamber Rules of Procedure 2017 ("the Rules")**

in connection with

17 Almanythie Road, Peterhead, AB42 1LD ("the Property")

Case Reference: FTS/HPC/EV/26/0976

Carol-Anne Gill and Graeme Gill ("the Applicant")

1. The application was made under Rule 109 of the Procedural Rules being an application for an eviction order in connection with a private residential tenancy. The application was accompanied by supporting documentation
2. By way of email dated 10th April 2026 a request for further information was sent to the Applicants. The Applicants replied, seeking an extension of time, to 22nd May 2026 to lodge the information. This was granted by the Tribunal. No substantive response was received from the Applicants after that date.
3. A reminder was sent to the Applicants by way of email on 30th June 2026, giving a further 14 days to provide the information.. No response was received to that request.

DECISION

4. The circumstances in which an application is to be rejected are governed by Rule 8 of the Chamber Procedural Rules. That Rule provides:-

"Rejection of application

8. —(1) The Chamber President or another member of the First-tier Tribunal under the

delegated powers of the Chamber President, must reject an application if –

- (a) they consider that the application is frivolous or vexatious;*
- (b) the dispute to which the application relates has been resolved;*
- (c) they have good reason to believe that it would not be appropriate to accept the application;*
- (d) they consider that the application is being made for a purpose other than a purpose specified in the application; or*
- (e) the applicant has previously made an identical or substantially similar application and in the opinion of the Chamber President or another member of the First-tier Tribunal, under the delegated powers of the Chamber President, there has been no significant change in any material considerations since the identical or substantially similar application was determined.*

(2) Where the Chamber President, or another member of the First-tier Tribunal, under the delegated powers of the Chamber President, makes a decision under paragraph (1) to reject an application the First-tier Tribunal must notify the applicant and the notification must state the reason for the decision."

5. After consideration of the application, the further information referred to and correspondence from the Applicant, the Legal Member considers that the application should be rejected on the basis that it would not be appropriate to accept the application within the meaning of Rule

8(1)(c) of the Procedural Rules.

REASONS FOR DECISION

6. Two requests were made for further information from the Applicants. This additional information requested was necessary to allow the application to proceed.
7. In the absence of any response by the Applicants, it would not be appropriate to accept the application and accordingly it is rejected.

What you should do now

If you accept the Legal Member's decision, there is no need to reply.

If you disagree with this decision –

An applicant aggrieved by the decision of the Chamber President, or any Legal Member acting under delegated powers, may appeal to the Upper Tribunal for Scotland on a point of law only. Before an appeal can be made to the Upper Tribunal, the party must first seek permission to appeal from the First-tier Tribunal. That party must seek permission to appeal within 30 days of the date the decision was sent to them. Information about the appeal procedure can be forwarded to you on request.
