#### STATEMENT OF REASONS

in connection with

### THE INSPECTION HELD ON 29th September 2011

in relation to the property

Flat 2/2, 6 Brachelston Street, Greenock, PA16 9AD.

# 1. BACKGROUND

The Landlord is Mr A Spella, care of Morison Walker, 23 Patrick Street, Greenock.

The Tenant is Mr Torry. He has been a tenant of the property since the early 1950's. His tenancy is a registered tenancy in terms of the Rent (Scotland) Act 1984.

The current rent is £2032 per annum. The Landlord applied for the rent to be increased to £2438.40. The Rent Officer registered a rent of £2367.28 per annum with effect from 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2011. The Landlord referred the determination to the Private Rented Housing Panel ('PRHP').

# 2. THE INSPECTION

The committee inspected the property, which is an unimproved second floor flat in a three storey, traditional blonde sandstone tenement, which dates from circa 1890. The tenement has a slate roof, a communal door entry system and had been upgraded in the past.

The accommodation comprises two bed recesses, living room, kitchen and narrow bathroom. The windows throughout the property are double glazed and there is no central heating in the property. The floor area of the property is approximately 42.6 square metres.

There is a communal area at the rear of the tenement. The bins are stored in the communal cellar in the basement. The property is conveniently situated for public transport and local services.

# 4. THE HEARING

No hearing was requested by the parties.

# 5. THE DECISION

The committee had the following documents before them:-

- A copy of form RR1, the Landlord's application for registration of the rent.
- Written representations from the Landlord which state:-

'The rent awarded for this flat is £2367.28, £197.27 per calendar month and short of the £2438.40 requested. The property is in reasonable condition and close to the town centre and public transport to Glasgow and the Clyde Coats. A similar furnished property is currently being offered for rent at £360 per calendar month in the same block and in nearby Wellington Street and Dempster Street similar one bedroom flats are on offer at £350- £400 per calendar month.

We can see no reason for a valid objection to the rent awarded of less than £200 per calendar month giving the location and condition of the flat and the rent for similar properties in the area.'

- Written representations on behalf of the Tenant which state:-
  - Comparable Properties are subjective depending on the condition of the property and as such an on site inspection is welcome.
  - The tenant has been resident in Flat 2/2 since 1950 and as an example the bathroom suite is still the same as in 1950. The Tenant is unable to install a gas fire since the chimney needs to be lined. (The Tenant at his own expense installed an electric shower and an electric fire, which does not give off the same heat). No services are provided. The stairs and gardens are maintained by the residents.
  - There has been no demonstrable actions performed to warrant any increase in rent, never mind a 16% increase, and especially given the lack of modernisation.'
- The decision of the PRHP dated 21st June 2011 which determined the following rents:-

The committee considered the documents provided.

The committee were mindful of the terms of section 48(1) of The Rent (Scotland) Act 1984, which requires the committee 'to have regard to all of the circumstances (other than personal circumstances) and in particular to apply their knowledge and experience of current rents of comparable property in the area, as well as having regard to the age, character and locality of the dwelling house in question and to its state of repair and, if any furniture is provided for use under the tenancy, and to the quantity, quality and condition of the furniture'. Also section 48(2) which requires them to 'assume that the number of persons seeking to become tenants of similar dwelling- houses in the locality on the terms (other than those relating to rent) of the regulated tenancy is not substantially greater than the number of such dwelling- houses which are available to let on such terms.'

The committee carefully considered which of the three methods of assessing the rent was appropriate in this case. The three recognised methods used in Scotland are (1) determining the fair rent by reference to comparable registered rents in the area. (2) determining the fair rent by reference to market rents of comparable properties allowing for appropriate deductions for scarcity and (3)

determining the fair rent by reference to the anticipated annual return based on the capital value of the property. None of these methods is the primary method. The appropriate method depends on the facts and circumstances of each case.

The committee considered the rental evidence provided by the Landlord's agents. No details of the particular features of the properties were provided and therefore the committee found this evidence to be of limited value.

The committee from its own experience, knowledge and the information it had obtained from the internet acknowledged that the rentals of one bedroom properties in the Greenock area ranged from £350 to £400 per month and the rentals of two bedroom properties in the Greenock area ranged from £400 to £475 per month. The committee acknowledged that the PRHP decision dated 21st June 2011 stated that the range of rents for one bedroom properties in the Greenock area were £365 to £375 per month and two bedroom properties in the Greenock area were £400 to £500 per month. Therefore the committee acknowledged that the PRHP decision dated 21st June 2011 still reflected the current market rents of comparable properties in the Greenock area.

As stated the committee had obtained details of the market rents of many other similar sized properties available to lease in the area from the internet. In light of this evidence and the PRHP decision dated 21st June 2011, referred to above, the committee considered that the method of using comparable market rents was the best evidence available and proceeded to assess the rents of the properties using this method. The committee also acknowledged that there is a plentiful supply of similar properties to rent in the area and therefore there is no scarcity of supply of such properties at this time.

The committee considered the evidence of market rents in the PRHP decision dated 21st June 2011 to be the best evidence available. In particular the committee considered the rental evidence of the property 2/2, 61 Nicholson Street, Greenock to be of particular assistance. However adjustments were required to reflect the particular features of the property 2/2, 6 Brachelston Street, Greenock including the fact that the property is unimproved, it has no central heating, no modern fitted kitchen, no separate bedroom and it has not been rewired or decorated by the Landlord.

Having taken all the relevant factors into account the committee determined that the fair rent for this property is £2200 per annum.

In reaching this decision the committee have had regard to all the considerations required to be taken into account in terms of Section 48 of the Rent (Scotland) Act 1984.
